

Consumer Information Statement

Students in Prison Education Programs (34 CFR 668.43(a)(5)(vi))

If a prison education program is designed to meet educational requirements for a specific professional license or certification that is required for employment in an occupation, the institution must make readily available to enrolled and prospective students information regarding whether that occupation typically involves State or Federal prohibitions on the licensure or employment of formerly confined or incarcerated individuals.

Consumer Information page for the Associate of Arts Program

Licensure: There are no required licensures associated with this program.

Certification: There are no required certifications associated with this program.

Options to Complete the Associate of Arts Program Post-Release: Students who do not finish their program while they are incarcerated and wish to complete their remaining program requirements post-release have many options. All Texas community colleges offer the Associate of Arts program including Houston Community College, Alvin Community College, and Lone Star College. A current list of Texas community colleges offering Associate of Arts program (or any other program) can be found by googling "THECB Program Inventory." All Texas community colleges accept transfer credits from other Texas community colleges, and they all use the same course numbering system, so transferring courses from one community college to another is straightforward.

Financial Options to Complete the Associate of Arts Program Post-Release: Students who wish to complete their remaining program requirements post-release have several financial options. Lee College, like all Texas community colleges, provides financial assistance including Pell Grants, Texas Equal Opportunity Grants (TEOG), Texas Public Education Grants (TPEG), and other financial aid programs. In addition, Lee College and most other Texas community colleges provide payment plans to help students budget their payments.
